KEGGERS & CONSEQUENCES

HOUSE PARTIES AND THE LAW

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

- 1. If you sell tickets or take money for anything connected to a kegger (like "complimentary" cups, T-Shirts, entertainment, etc.) then by law you are selling alcohol:
 - a. It is against the law to sell alcohol without a licence or a special occasion permit.
 - b. Keggers will not qualify for licence or permits.
 - c. It is also against the law to buy alcohol from a person who has no licence or permit.
- 2. It is against the law to serve alcohol to an intoxicated person or to a person under 19 years of age.
- 3. It is against the law to drink alcohol if you are under 19 years of age except in a private home with a parent or guardian.
- 4. It is against the law to drink alcohol or be intoxicated in a public place such as in the road or on the sidewalk.
- 5. It is against the law to create disturbances and bother neighbours.

BEWARE OF CONSEQUENCES

- 1. If you live where a house party is held and you consent even by attending or supporting it then by law you are hosting it.
- 2. Police can and will raid a kegger and seize kegger equipment and alcohol. Seized items are forfeited. If you host a kegger you are responsible for any costs associated with forfeiture.
- 3. If you host a kegger you can be charged for:
 - a. Selling alcohol without a licence or permit, or
 - b. Selling alcohol to an intoxicated guest or a guest under 19 years of age.
- 4. If you are a guest at a house party or kegger you can be charged for breaking the law by:
 - a. Buying alcohol from a person who has no licence or permit
 - b. Drinking alcohol if you are under 19 years of age, or
 - c. Drinking alcohol or being intoxicated in a public place if you are in the road or the sidewalk.
- 5. If you are charged under Kingston's NUISANCE PARTY BY-LAW, you cannot pay the fine online or by mail, and will be summonsed to appear at PROVINCIAL OFFENCES COURT. As a public record, Queen's University will have access to this information and could subject you to nonacademic misconduct proceedings.
- 6. Whether you are the host or a guest at a house party or kegger, if you are convicted of breaking the law you can face significant fines.
- 7. House parties and keggers can lead to lawsuits if someone is hurt or property is damaged. Students found legally responsible can face significant debt.
